Overview

This is a summary of how Orchard Mead Academy delivers music education across curriculum music, co-curricular provision, and musical experiences. It also outlines planned improvements for subsequent years.

Part A: Curriculum Music

- 1. Weekly Time Allocation

- Key Stage 4: 3 Hours

2. Curriculum Structure

The curriculum follows the Model Music Curriculum and is adapted based on the recent Ofsted Review into music national; in response to this Orchard Mead specialises in a set of instruments which allows students to beyond surface level interactions with instruments, to genuinely building competence over their classroom lessons

3. Opportunities in Lessons

Students learn foundational knowledge on a set of instruments and all theory is scaffolded around DR T SMITH – which is later heavily used in GCSE Music.

4. SEND Inclusion

Music is carefully scaffolded and adapted to support learners who are disabled or SEND; all SEND and disabled children are given every opportunity to access instruments as a supportive in breakfast club and in our three afterschool music clubs.

5. Music Qualifications

Students in KS4 take OCR GCSE Music and are supported in this through 1-to-1 weekly instrument lessons with expert external teachers – all students receive support to a grade 3 standard which sets them up to access every mark possible for their solo and ensemble performances.

Students in KS3 receiving 1-to-1 music lessons take graded music exams in their subjects.

Numerous talented students from KS3 are given access to these same instrument lessons to support future progress in music

Part B: Co-Curricular Music

1. Music Tuition

Music is delivered in group sessions with OMA specialisms in guitar, ukulele, piano, drums, and ensemble work (including singing)

3. Practice and Rehearsal Space

There are three practice rooms and two classrooms that students access during breakfast club, break and lunch, and three afterschool sessions. Students are awared a music pass after attending an afterschool club to use practice rooms during break and lunch.

1. School Performances

The school production is Matilda, with additional concerts happening during celebrated holidays.

We have a wide range of students across all key stages who perform and partake in music performances.
